## Human Reproductive Technologies: Science, Ethics, and Society

DESCRIPTION:	Human reproductive technologies and practices have changed rapidly over the past 50 years, and further changes are anticipated in the 21 <sup>st</sup> century. This seminar will examine such developments from both historical and futuristic perspectives. Topics will include birth control, in vitro fertilization, sperm banks, surrogate parenting, and cloning. The science of such techniques will be reviewed at a level appropriate for a general audience. The social and ethical implications of changing reproductive technologies will also be discussed.
GRADING:	The course is graded on a P/NP basis. Your grade for the semester will depend entirely on attendance and class participation. In short, you <i>must</i> attend class regularly, and you <i>must</i> participate in class discussions in order to pass the course. More than one absence could lead to a grade of NP. Likewise, inadequate preparation (i.e., evidence that you have not done the readings) will be noted every week and will count as the functional equivalent of not attending class.
